

## **Port of Tilbury achieves further environmental accreditation**

The Port of Tilbury has been accredited its fourth certificate in Environmental Management Systems (EMS) to BS EN ISO 14001:2004 standard.

The Port gained its first certificate in 2003 when the Finnish Terminal received accreditation closely followed by the Short Sea Container Terminal, UPM Wood Facility and Enterprise Distribution Centre in 2006.

The Conventional Asset has now demonstrated how it controls the impact of its activities and services, continuing to improve its environmental performance and passed the audit on the first attempt.

The 3-day assessment was carried out by a Lloyds Register of Quality Assurance (LRQA) auditor. The Port will have to complete a re-assessment every three years.

Perry Glading, managing director of the Port of Tilbury said, "All members of management and staff are to be congratulated on their contribution to controlling and monitoring the impact of our activities, which has led to the company achieving this important environmental certificate".

The Port of Tilbury has a commitment to protecting the environment and will extend the scope of the certification across the entire business within the next year.
