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00. INTRODUCTION



Forth Ports is an exciting and dynamic business with eight strategically positioned ports across the UK.

This is both an important and exciting time to be part of Forth Ports and also the wider ports industry. We understand that creating opportunities from trade will contribute to regeneration, levelling-up and more job opportunities in the communities in which we operate. 01. THAMES FREEPORT

Boost for Thames Estuary as the country's second freeport opens for business.

The freeport is estimated to draw ± 4.5 billion of new investment and create 21,000 skilled jobs, bringing greater prosperity to some of the country's most deprived communities.

Positioned on the doorstep of the UK's busiest ports and largest labour market of London and the South East, the freeport will create a new global gateway for trade and benefit communities such as Thurrock, Barking, Dagenham and Havering, which have high rates of unemployment and child poverty.

Thames Freeport covers a 34 km-wide economic corridor and is supported by a share of ± 200 million of Government funding and tax incentives.

The freeport will be a world class hub of innovation and put the region at the forefront of the cutting-edge sectors of the future, with significant investment in hydrogen technology, battery storage and electric vehicles.

A new Thames Freeport Skills Accelerator will also bring industry together with local schools, colleges and universities to provide training and job opportunities so that local people can gain the skills they need and secure employment.

• The Port of Tilbury welcomed Rt Hon Boris Johnson MP to the UK's newest port on 31st January to officially open Tilbury2.

Visiting the Thames-based port, the Prime Minister was given a tour of the country's largest freight ferry terminal, the site of what will become Britain's biggest construction processing terminal and new border infrastructure, alongside meeting the port's key workers, apprentices and customers like P&O Ferries and Tarmac.

On the two year anniversary of the UK leaving the EU, the Prime Minister was given an overview of the technology-backed systems that streamline clearing the border, such as number plate recognition, and the 12-bay Border Control Post, which will house government agencies making physical checks.

The Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, said:

"It was an honour to officially open Tilbury2, the UK's newest port, and meet with key workers and apprentices on site.

Freeports are driving trade, investment and jobs right across the country and helping to capitalise on our newfound Brexit freedoms.

It is hugely welcome to see the Port of Tilbury going from strength to strength, benefiting not only businesses and workers but also the wider Thames Gateway region".

"Tilbury2 is a national success story. British financed and British built for a rapidly growing British company and delivered during the height of the pandemic.

Victoria Swing Bridge

Forth Ports has been granted Listed Building Consent by the City of Edinburgh Council to fully repair the Category A Listed Victoria Swing Bridge located at the Port of Leith to conserve the bridge for the future and create a useable space for the local community.

The Port of Dundee welcomed the arrival of the 177-metre long deep sea vessel the Ha Long Bay with her cargo of 12,000 packs of plywood on board.

The large cargo vessel sailed up the Tay direct from the far east (China) and is one of the largest cargo vessels to be handled at the busy port. The 12,000 packs of plywood were discharged in record time by the expert port team who completed the job in just 15 days. The large shipment of plywood is destined for UK construction projects around the country.





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03. BUSINESS LEADERS TO TURBO CHARGE ECONOMY

Prime Minister Boris Johnson launches new Business Council on two-year Brexit anniversary, as part of ambitions to assert UK as the best place in the world to do business.

Charles Hammond OBE, Chief executive of Forts Ports Group commented:

"Global Britain is the platform to promote innovation, skills and productivity for all UK businesses, large and small.

This will ensure we are 21st century-ready to trade, attract foreign investment and drive green-based business jobs and growth. Infrastructure and skills investment in port areas will improve productivity and create jobs in many coastal areas in need of regeneration." The Prime Minister's revamped Business Council, co-chaired by the Chancellor, will convene a new cohort of business leaders to work in partnership with the Government, helping to drive a high productivity, high growth economy over the next 12 months and level up local economies around the country.

The new Council will support the UK's recovery from Covid-19 and prioritise delivering the green industrial revolution, developing a skilled workforce and unlocking global investment. This follows the Prime Minister's pledge today to capitalise on regulatory freedoms two years on from our departure from the EU, in another move that will support businesses to invest, innovate and create jobs.

Building on the successes of last year's Build Back Better Business Council, the Prime Minister's Business Council will retain and implement the three core pillars of the Plan for Growth framework – infrastructure, innovation, and skills – against which Council members will continue to translate goals into measurable action.

Meeting at least quarterly, the Prime Minister's Business Council will be comprised of 28 members from a range of industries and sectors, including manufacturing, financial services, energy, and world renowned science and technology sectors. The Business Secretary and Trade Secretary will be standing members, with the addition of the Education Secretary to focus on skills. Other Cabinet Ministers will attend meetings as required.

The first Prime Minister's Business Council is scheduled for the coming weeks, and will be co-chaired by the Prime Minister and the Chancellor.

RE: SCOTLAND



The Port of Grangemouth has completed and opened a multimillionpound rail freight hub with the arrival of DRS's Aberdeen freight train service. The new rail freight hub at Scotland's largest port saw an investment of ± 3 million, and with this increased capacity it further secures its position as the key strategic freight and export/import hub for Scotland with a direct link to the port's busy container terminal.



04. MOCEAN SEA TRIAL

The vision for the device is for it to become a local source of renewable energy for subsea controls and devices, taking away the requirement to run miles of electrical cable to offshore installations. Wave energy is set to make a significant contribution to the future Scottish and UK low-carbon energy mix needed to meet our net zero obligations.

Rosyth welcomed Mocean into the port. Their 20-metre-long, 38-tonne Wave Energy Device (WED) has been fabricated wholly in Scotland and will be deployed at the European Marine Energy Centre's Scapa Flow test site for sea trials. The WED transforms kinetic wave energy into electrical power.

Rosyth also saw the arrival of the Iron Lady carrying the topside of a North Sea rig which was in the port before being transported to Methil for decommissioning. An impressive operation saw the largest construction vessel in the world, the Pioneering Spirit, lift the topside onto the Iron Lady in the Forth Estuary before the Iron Lady made its way to Rosyth.

05. SPECTACULAR SIGHTS ON RIVER FORTH

Onlookers on both the north and south banks of the Forth Estuary were treated to a spectacular view as one of the most remarkable marine operations ever undertaken on the river unfolded before their eyes.

In an operation spanning two days, Allseas' Pioneering Spirit – at 382 metres long and 124 metres wide, the largest construction vessel in the world - transferred its huge cargo of a topside drilling platform onto a 200-metre-long cargo barge, the Iron Lady. The following day, the Pioneering Spirit, which was specifically designed for the single-lift installation and removal of large offshore platforms,

separated from the Iron Lady and the cargo barge was towed clear. The Pioneering Spirit then set off once more for the North Sea.

With its cargo safely secured to its deck, the Iron Lady was then towed westwards along the River Forth by Forth Ports' tugs, the Craigleith, Inchcolm and Fidra, in a carefully planned operation to ensure the



structure had sufficient clearance to transit below the iconic Forth Bridge, then the Forth Road Bridge and finally the Queensferry Crossing before berthing alongside at the Port of Rosyth. It is scheduled to remain moored at the Port of Rosyth for around six weeks before being towed back east along the river to Energy Park Fife in Methil, where its cargo will be unloaded for decommissioning.

07. ATTENTION TO LOGISTICS

Attention to Logistics was launched in 2017 setting out to establish a bursary scheme and create train facilities specifically targeted at the veteran community helping ex-service personnel and their families back into work.

Despite the restrictions of the Covid pandemic, Attention to Logistics continued to support veterans through the supply of laptop computers and online learning.

The program continues to support veterans and works with Walking with the Wounded, Regular Forces Employment Association and the Royal British Legion.

Working with the Road Haulage Association in Scotland we supported ex-service to get their HGV licence through extensive training, and supporting candidates in the Port of Tilbury with IOSH (Institute of Occupational Safety and Health) and NEBOSH (The National Examination Board in Occupational Safety and Health) gualifications. We know that people are upskilling and getting into work. From forklifts to straddle carriers we have supported back to work driving skills for over 100 veterans, alongside interview preparation and CV writing and various training courses that all help with the individual's career path to employment.

BECO NEWS

The team consisting of Robert Mitchelmore (Business Analyst), Hope Ralston (Electrical Engineering Apprentice, Port of Grangemouth), Calum Green (Electrical Engineering Apprentice, Port of Leith) and Adam Hunter (Mechanical Engineering Apprentice, Port of Grangemouth) were set the 'Grangemouth Net Zero Challenge'. The challenge had three phases, known as sprints, and for this particular programme, which lasts around four months, INEOS set the challenges in consultation with the Scottish Government. The project is supported by INEOS, which operates from their site in Grangemouth , and Fuel Change, a not-for-profit organisation which has the core aim of developing innovative low carbon solutions to real issues currently being faced by industry and wider society, and providing a platform for young people to have their say.

Launched on 1st July 2021, the challenge had teams, made up of apprentices and young people employed at businesses in the Grangemouth area, come together to face one of four challenges and to devise their own solutions. A team of Forth Ports employees took part in a new Net Zero initiative which aims to challenge the brightest young minds from across Scotland to come up with fresh ways to tackle climate change.

Robert Mitchelmore said:

"I decided to take on the Fuel Change challenge as it was a really good opportunity to see what ideas me and my team could come up with in our industry.

As a port, we have a lot of heavy goods vehicle movement and we identified this a potential source of energy that we could utilise. Through doing more research we realised that traffic turbines could be the solution for this. It's been really good to work with other people my own age and do something completely different to my day job."

Team Forth Ports completed Sprint 3 of the Fuel Change Challenge by presenting to the following panel of judges on 8th October at the Skills & Business Centre, Grangemouth:

Liam Middleton - Head of Critical Energy Infrastructure & Commercial Projects at The Scottish Government Caroline Strain - Head of Place - Falkirk Grangemouth Investment Zone at Scottish Enterprise Bob Tooze - now retired but spent over 33 years in the Chemical Industry in various companies (ICI, Ineos, Sasol). David Smith - Fuel Change

Their presentation was very well received by the panel of judges. They really liked their concept (thought the original risk was limited with a clear outcome and potential wider community benefit), thought their style was professional, market research was thorough and commercial analysis was really impressive.

Fuel change does not seek one outright winner, instead all final entries, which are considered to have business application, will be taken forward to implementation. So, watch this space!

09. TARGE TOWING

Forth Ports acquired Targe Towing in 2021, a towage and marine service company founded in 1992 by Tom and Jo Woolley and Nick Dorman.

When Targe Towing was established by husband and wife team Tom and Jo Woolley with Nick Dorman nearly 30 years ago, it upset some current comfortable arrangements that were in place between family owned tug companies operating around the UK.

Jo felt that their new business needed a strong brand and proposed Targe, a round Highland shield, as an alternative to the original name of Peterhead Tugs Limited. Since then, the Targe has consolidated its presence throughout the northeast coast of Scotland and today Targe is a first class and extremely professional marine services business with an excellent reputation for servicing customers and safety in its operations led by an excellent management team. Targe owns a fleet of nine vessels, including five tugs, which operate in waters throughout the East of Scotland, as well as managing a further three tugs which operate at the Hound Point marine terminal on the Firth of Forth. Forth Ports' fleet numbers 10, including four tugs.

11. FORTH PORTS ACQUIRES OMHL

Forth Ports Limited ("Forth Ports") and OM Heavy Lift ("OMHL") were pleased to announce Forth Ports' acquisition of OMHL on 9th February 2022.

This acquisition further enhances Forth Ports' ability to offer an attractive, full-service package for offshore renewables projects, providing marine services: quavside infrastructure and land: and now, with OMHL, heavy lift plant and logistics solutions.

OMHL is a well-established. professional project engineering company that has worked closely with Forth Ports on a number of large-scale projects in the renewables and decommissioning sectors. Based in Dundee, OMHL's wide range of experience and unrivalled fleet of specialist heavy lift plant - including the UK's largest permanent quayside crane - will work across Forth Ports' Scottish operations, including the ports of Leith, Grangemouth, Rosyth and Dundee.

OMHL will continue to be led by Managing Director, Alex Fyfe, who will work directly with David Webster, as the newly appointed Director of Energy for Forth Ports.

The Port of Leith Renewable Energy Hub has the potential to:

- Make a major contribution to Scotland achieving its 2045 net zero greenhouse gases target
- Secure the Firth of Forth as the driver for Scotland's green energy transition
- Help spearhead Edinburgh's and Scotland's COVID-19 recovery plan
- Support up to one thousand high-quality, long-term direct jobs and around two thousand indirect jobs.

This £40 million private investment will see the creation of a bespoke, riverside marine berth capable of accommodating the world's largest offshore wind installation vessels. The facility will feature a heavy lift capability of up to 100 tonnes per square metre, backed up by 35 acres of adjacent land for logistics and marshalling. This will be supplemented by the upgrading of a 140-acre cargohandling site to accommodate lay down, assembly, supply chain and manufacturing opportunities. The total area is equivalent to around 100 full-size football pitches.

Charles Hammond OBE. Group Chief Executive of Forth Ports, said:

"Today's news is another important strategic move for Forth Ports as we secure our place in the offshore renewables sector, following the recent announcement of the ScotWind leasing round. We are investing significantly in Dundee and Leith to create an attractive offering for offshore renewables which will support the country's transition to net zero. The acquisition of OMHL, coupled with that of Targe Towing, places Forth Ports in a strong position to play a leading role in supporting Scotland's offshore renewables future."

Alex Fyfe, Managing Director of OMHL, said:

"This is an exciting new chapter for OMHL as we combine our skills and expertise with the broader Forth Ports business. We have a strong relationship with the Forth Ports team that we look forward to developing further in the fastgrowing offshore renewables market."





12. CRUISE

13. FORTH PORTS HISTORIC CONNECTIONS WITH TWO QUEENS

Mary Queen of Scots landed in Leith on the 19th August 1561 after returning from France.

She had an arduous journey from Calais to Leith as her cousin Queen Elizabeth I denied her a safe passage through England. This was because Mary had refused to sign the Treaty of Edinburgh which gave up her claim to the throne in England and Ireland.

Mary arrived in the Port of Leith, one of the biggest Ports in Europe, unexpectedly and no preparations had been made to welcome her back to Scotland so she dined in 'Andro Lambis House' before being escorted to the Palace of Holyrood.

In her speech Queen Elizabeth I defends her strength as a female leader saying:

"I know I have the body but of a weak and feeble women; but I have the heart and stomach of a king, and a king of England too"

Queen Elizabeth I made a speech on the 9th August 1588 in Tilbury, this speech has become one of the defining moments of British history.

Robert Dudley was put in charge of the land army at Tilbury and arranged for the Queen to visit Tilbury and rally her troops as they went into battle with the Spanish Armada.

The defeat of the Spanish Armada has long been held as one of England's greatest military achievements and boosted the prestige of Queen Elizabeth I encouraging a sense of pride and nationalism.





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
